#### Parish Council News

At the meeting held on the 1<sup>st</sup> February, the Parish Council was informed by PCSO Billings that the numbers of PCSOs is likely to be reduced over time. The Council will be sending a letter to the Police Commissioner in support of the excellent service provided by the PCSO's within the parish.

The Parish Council was pleased to hear that the diversion through the parish due to the work being carried out in Looe appears to be running smoothly with no complaints to date.

It has come to the Council's attention that some parishioners were unaware of the public meeting held to give information about a potential new housing development in Widegates Village. It has instructed its clerk to request that the developers arrange a second public meeting with at least a four week notice period so that parishioners have the best opportunity to find out about it.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on the 5<sup>th</sup> April and all are welcome to attend it. The Council, at this meeting, will seek to obtain public opinion of potential uses for the telephone boxes located at Sandplace and in Widegates Village. A partnership scheme with Community Heartbeat is available and the Council would encourage those people or organisations with an interest in seeing them used for the community to attend the meeting.

The Council is pleased to announce that by the time this is read, people waiting for a bus at Nomansland should be able to do so with some protection from the weather due to the new shelter having been erected.

Elections are looming – please contact the clerk if you are considering standing as a Parish Councillor and would like more information about the role of a councillor or the election process.

#### Country Remedies – Herbs

Herbs have been used over many centuries, both as health remedies and also for the flavouring of foods.

The earliest known printed work on herbs was by Peter Trewens in 1526, followed by Gerard, Parkinson and Culpeper Parkinson summed up by saying, 'It is not only for food and medicine that we owe them so much. Thus, I have shewed ye all the varieties of nature, pointing unto them and so describing them, and now I bring you rest upon the grasse.'

The earliest gatherers of countryside herbs were the 'simplers' who discovered the plants and dared to taste them for the first time. They searched the hedgerows for rare herbs and found mainly only nettles and dandelions; nevertheless, these were 'healing' and useful plants to be taken to market, or for use by the herbalist.

Some were included in family meals, pounded or mixed for aiding illness. Many were used as dyes in spinning and weaving, woad gave them blue, madder produced red, agrimony – yellow etc. Artists also experimented with these same plants to obtain colours and fixatives for their palettes.

Ladies beautified themselves gathering herbs from the garden or countryside to make hair-dyes, freckle removers, skin lotions, washing-balls, starch for laces and sweet smelling herb bags.

Houses and farms had their still rooms with dried plants hanging from the rafters and aromatic herbs contained in pots. Sir Hugh Platt describes, 'You may place them upon shelves without the room (window sills) to receive the warm sun, or temperate rain at your pleasure. You may also hang in the roof, sides of the room, small Pompions or Cowcumbers, pricked full of barley and these will be overgrown with green spices.'

Some Healing Herbs:

<u>Garlic</u> – Colds and coughs, congestion of lungs and gargle for sore throats; a good blood cleanser and flu remedy.

<u>Rosemary</u> - Will ease Asthma, also Mullien fights respiratory viruses. Tumeric (contains curcumin, which has anti-inflammatory antiviral and anti-tumour properties). Astragalus helps the immune system and is a tonic.

St John's Wort – (hypericum) a wound healer, believed to have infinite healing powers derived from the Saint himself. Dedicated to St John the Baptist by the monks, the red juice of its leaves represent his blood and is regarded as protection against the devil. It was known as 'devil's flight.' It has been used to cleanse a haunted house of evil spirits by placing the herb under a pillow. Culpepper described it as 'a most noble anti-venereal.' A salve made from the flowers was valued in English villages for scratches and small wounds. The flowers as they blossomed were made into gargles and lotions. Oil, reddened with the juice was kept in Apothecaries shops for burns. An infusion is made from St John's Wort leaves, flowers and stems for stomach disorders.
