Celebration of Crafts, Interests and Hobbies was greatly appreciated

What an interesting and exciting day 1st September turned out to be. The church was full of colourful displays and chatty people, plenty of food and drink and a brilliant band of volunteers keeping it all going. Quite apart from the simple enjoyment of admiring each other's creativity and making new friends, the event also raised a very welcome £235 towards the planned improvements to the church. Sincere thanks to all involved.

Morval Estate Building consultation

The survey and public consultation was conducted over six months starting in April 2018 with 50 letters and a similar number of emails going to residents of Morval Parish. The public consultation held on the same day as the annual parish meeting. I addressed St Martin's Parish Council the following night.

Adverts were placed in the parish magazine and notices were displayed in the local shops. The consultation was attended by about 20 people. 24 people responded to an online survey. Some residents wrote letters, made private phone calls and sent me emails. Others filled in the posted questionnaire. Where possible I have tallied the opinions of those who gave qualitative feedback.

Therefore, the consultation did achieve a significant response, but there was a bias towards those who felt strongly about the matter as opposed to those who felt neutral. There may also have been those who would liked to have responded but were not aware or able.

There is a substantial agreement (80% of respondents) that there should be more homes to rent and they should be there for fulfilling local need. There would be resistance to holiday homes and some would not support the homes sold on the open market.

There were also some who vociferously resisted any development (concerns about building on green-field, ruining views, poor access, devaluing homes, feel that there are other more appropriate places for development outside Morval such as Widegates or Looe).

Anecdotally most people living in Morval would prefer that the houses were built near Nomansland and most living in Nomansland would prefer the new builds were in Morval. Home owners are more resistant to new builds than people already in the private rented sector.

In terms of the location of the new builds the data suggests that Nomansland is peoples' first preference followed by the field opposite Bindown and then Penarthtown. Tregarland and Gellies were the least popular places. Many respondents would consider any site.

On the size of the houses, there was no obvious consensus, although two or three-bedroom properties were favoured over one or four-bedroom homes. Similarly, there was divided opinions on who should live in the properties. A third wanted families, another third wanted it for over 50s and the remainder stated no preference.

Other observations are that people were concerned about the design of the homes (sympathetic to the landscape/make it in keeping/stone facing) and appropriate for the frail and disabled where feasible. Where possible local firms should be used to do the building work. The provision of parking (2 cars) and gardens for residents was requested.

I also note that Nomansland is due to have more houses built by the Duchy of Cornwall in the not too distant future.

Conclusions

Given the feedback and my desire to minimise risk with the first self-build Morval Estate would like to seriously consider developing a semi-detached bungalow in Penarthtown over the next 18 months, with the hope of a larger project in the longer term,





Planets visible in the south

During this month, the five planets known since ancient times are strung out in a line to the left of the Sun. Although Venus and Mercury are setting at about the same time as the Sun and so are not visible, Jupiter, Saturn and Mars can be seen. Early in October, soon after sunset, Jupiter is low in the South-west skies, with Saturn west of south, and Mars east of south (see below).



As the evening progresses, the planets will move westwards, due to the Earth's spin. Jupiter will therefore set soon, Saturn some time after nine o'clock, although Mars will be visible until after midnight.



As October progresses, the Moon will have an increasing effect. On 14th October, the Moon (between quarter and half phase) will be near to Saturn, and four days later, the Moon (now between half and three-quarter phase) will have moved to be near Mars.

Using the Moon to find your way around the sky can be a bit of a 'double-edged sword'. It's easy to find, but as its phase increases, it does wash out the part of the sky it's in. Perhaps use the Moon to find and recognise the planet, then on subsequent nights, as the Moon moves across the sky, the planet is easier to see.
