A STORY by Heather Taylor

AMOS

Early fifties. Dark brown hair, peppered grey. Open, honest face, tanned and weather-beaten from a life spent outdoors. A ready smile. A deep, kind voice.

I have spent my whole life living out of doors. Shepherds are rarely at home for long. My father and his father before him were the same. Always away from home keeping watches in the night over their flocks. Actually, with my father and grandfather, they didn't own the sheep. I'm lucky. I have my own farm and own my flocks. My sons are the same. They were both quick to learn as children and intelligent with it, too. Got their heads screwed on, my boys have. My wife, Sarah, is the same. I couldn't read or write when we married, but she helped and encouraged me. I thank God for the wife I was given. Without her my life wouldn't be what it is now.

Back when I first started work, things were tough. Many people were struggling to make ends meet. Things were expensive. Some couldn't find work. I was glad to be in the family business, so to speak. When someone works the land, growing crops or looking after animals, it tends to get passed down the generations, father to son. To begin with I looked after other people's sheep, like my father and grandfather did. I remember that we weren't terribly liked as a family. We were looked down on. It was because we had to work every day and couldn't observe the Sabbath like everyone else. It didn't help that everyone around us was either a priest or had a relative who was a priest. I'd like to know from where they would have got their lambs for the sacrifices without shepherds like us. It wasn't as if they kept a flock at the back of the Temple for such purposes.

It never ceases to amaze me how rude people can be, and they're usually the ones who call themselves religious. It comes from not thinking, Sarah says. She's right. We were forever being told that we were breaking the law. It wasn't just the priests, as well.

That's one of the things I like about being a shepherd. The peace and quiet. Out there on the hills, a man doesn't have to talk, even when others are there working with him. There's just the land, the animals, the sky. Not many get to experience the peace and wonder of a night sky brimming with stars. Those small flecks of light often seem to me part of a bigger light that is hidden behind a great veil. There was one night, years ago now, when that veil was twitched aside briefly and a handful of men were allowed a glimpse of what was beyond. I was lucky enough to be one of them.

I can remember that night so vividly it's like it happened yesterday. I hadn't yet met my Sarah so was still living with my parents in their house in the suburbs of Jerusalem. The night started out like one of the usual watches, a group of us and our great flock of quiet sheep. Most of the animals were Temple property; others belonged to local wealthy landowners. It was my friend, Benjamin, who first voiced what we'd all been feeling. Ben and I were practically raised in the same crib together. Our families lived next door to each other. My father and his, both shepherds, both friends. Another thing to go down the generations. Ben was never one to say a dozen words when one would do. But that night, well, Ben was eloquent to the point of being poetic. I smile on it now but back then, what he said seemed sort of fitting for the occasion.

The day had been gentle and calm and the night was too. All the stars were out and a moon, big and bright and brilliant. The sheep were dozing. They never do a whole lot at that time. It's the early morning when they start getting troublesome and frisky. We'd all had our supper and had something to drink and were as sleepy as the sheep. It was then that Ben noticed that the sheep were getting a little restless and that everything seemed somehow brighter. I thought the sheep had got confused thinking it was dawn already. But there was nothing to account for that brightness. Then Joel, one of the other shepherds, pointed up at the hilltop. A man was standing there, goodness knows how long for. He didn't approach us and we didn't go up to him. Truth was we were a little afraid. Silly to admit, I know. There we were, a group of strong men used to hard work, surrounded by hundreds of sheep, and there he was, one man alone

Chancel Repair Liability - the sequel!

With apologies to anyone who was alarmed by last month's report on CRL, we can now give a reassuring update. It was necessary for the PCC to fully investigate the implications of CRL in our parish, because we would have compromised the insurance policy on the church building and our eligibility for possible grants if we had not done so. This was a difficult and extremely time consuming process, but we did manage to complete the task and were therefore able to make an informed decision.

The decision that we made was not to register the Chancel Repair Liability that applies to plots of land in the parish of Morval. The main reason is the negative impact that registration might have on the mission of the church, and the potential hardship that might be caused in some areas of the parish. This does of course have financial implications for the church, but we would rather receive support through goodwill than by legal enforcement.
